Thank you for joining us today for Ulysses S. Grant's bicentennial birthday at General Grant National Memorial, commonly known as Grant's Tomb. It is the largest Mausoleum in North America and is the final resting place of former General and President Grant and his wife, Julia Dent Grant.

The National Park Service has protected and maintained Grant's Tomb since 1959 when it was designated as a unit of the National Park Service. Since then, we are dedicated to preserving the Memorial and sharing the achievements that Grant accomplished during his lifetime, as a civilian, Commanding General of the Union Army and 18th President of the United States.

"Let Us Have Peace" was not only Grant's slogan when he was running for President, but also the way he wished to heal and unite the nation after the Civil War.



Ulysses S. Grant was fresh out of the United States Military Academy at West Point, when he reported for duty with the 4th U.S. Infantry on September 30, 1843 at Jefferson Barracks in St. Louis, Missouri, the largest military post in the country at the time. The 21-year-old second lieutenant found his work as a quartermaster, managing equipment and supplies, to be dull.


Lieutenant General Darryl A. Williams, West Point General

Lieutenant General Darryl Williams currently serves as the 60th Superintendent of the United States Military Academy at West Point, responsible for developing the leaders of character the Army requires for its vision to deploy, fight and win decisively against any adversary, anytime and anywhere.

A 1983 West Point graduate, General Williams has commanded at all levels in a variety of Army, joint and multinational assignments, including the Army's Warrior Transition Command, U.S. Army Africa and most recently, NATO Allied Land Command in Turkey.

He has also deployed in support of Operation DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM;

Operation IRAQI FREEDOM and Operation UNITED ASSISTANCE in Liberia, where he led Department of Defense response efforts to the Ebola outbreak crisis in Africa.



Brooks D. Simpson, Keynote Speaker

Brooks D. Simpson is ASU Foundation Professor of History at Arizona State University. The author of several books on the Civil War and Reconstruction, he is perhaps best known for Let Us Have Peace: Ulysses S. Grant and the Politics of War and Reconstruction (1991) and Ulysses S. Grant: Triumph Over Adversity, 1822-1865 (2000).

Frank J. Scaturro is an attorney and author. His writings include President Grant Reconsidered (1998) and The Supreme Court's Retreat from Reconstruction (2000), and he is the co-editor of the forthcoming collection of essays entitled Grant at 200: Reconsidering the Life and Legacy of Ulysses S. Grant. He is the president of the Grant Monument Association, which is dedicated to the preservation of Grant's Tomb. He previously served as Counsel for the Constitution for the Senate Judiciary Committee and as special counsel to the House Select Investigative Panel. He currently serves as vice-president and senior counsel of the Judicial Crisis Network.




Ulysses Grant Dietz, Great great grandson of Ulysses S Grant

Ulysses Grant Dietz grew up in Syracuse, New York. He studied French at Yale (BA, 1977), and was trained to be a museum curator in the University of Delaware's Winterthur Program in American Material Culture (MA, 1980). A decorative arts curator at the Newark Museum for thirty-seven years before he retired, Ulysses has never stopped writing, including a book on the White House published in 2009.

Ulysses is a great-great grandson of Ulysses S. Grant. His late mother, Julia, was the President's last living great-grandchild; youngest daughter of Ulysses S. Grant III, and granddaughter of the president's eldest son, Frederick. He is on the board of the U.S. Grant Presidential Library and Museum at Mississippi State University.
